Preparing for disasters

In an ongoing effort to better prepare our communities in the event of a disaster, Puget Sound Energy Foundation has a \$1 million campaign to outfit vulnerable locations with high-capacity generators to be used during emergencies. The generators are given to nonprofit organizations and will support key responders in our service area, including emergency shelters and food distribution centers.

The generator for Food Lifeline will provide the energy necessary to establish a secure staging area for getting emergency food and supplies to affected areas. It will ensure that walk-in coolers and freezers remain functional saving approximately 3 million pounds of perishable food.

The Community Disaster Shelter at Bellevue Presbyterian Church will serve as a primary shelter for any families or individuals who cannot return to their home during a disaster. It can hold 200 people for 30 days providing them two meals a day.
