For comparison, the current average mix of resources supplying Puget Sound Energy includes: Coal (23%), Wind (16%), Natural Gas (23%), Hydroelectric (27%), Unspecified (10%), Nuclear (<1%), Solar (<1%), and Other (<1%). This resource mix was prepared in accordance with Washington State Department of Commerce, December 2023, with data reported by PSE in August 2023.

The average home in the United States uses 886 kWh per month. [Source: U.S. EIA, 2021]. The average PSE residential customer uses 882 kWh per month (based on 2020 data).
